# ROBERT SARVER

## MANAGING PARTNER



### THE OWNER

As an 8-year-old boy, Robert Sarver attended his first Phoenix Suns basketball game after receiving tickets as a birthday gift from Donald Diamond, one of the franchise's original owners. Thirty-five years later in 2004, Sarver became the majority owner of one of the NBA's model franchises, assembling a group of investors that purchased the Suns, the WNBA's Phoenix Mercury, and the operating rights to US Airways Center, since renamed Talking Stick Resort Arena. In 2016, the Suns purchased their NBA G League affiliate and relocated the team to Prescott Valley to operate as the Northern Arizona Suns.

In 13 years under Sarver's leadership, the Suns have enjoyed great success on the court. His tenure includes three appearances in the Western Conference Finals and two of the three 60-win seasons in the franchise's 49-year history. Phoenix owns the 11th-best record in the NBA since the start of the 2004-05 season (564-486, .537).

Sarver's passion for winning extends beyond the men's game. His commitment to the WNBA in Phoenix has resulted in the Mercury winning three league championships, in 2007, 2009 and 2014, with the team winning a WNBA-record 29 games in the 2014 regular season. Regular contenders for the title, the Mercury have made nine appearances in the league semifinals in the past 11 seasons. Over the last 13 seasons through 2017, the Mercury's record of 239-203 ranks it fifth in the WNBA in wins.

Guided by his stated mission, the Suns and Mercury organizations are industry leaders in business innovation and community outreach and involvement. Sarver is a member of the NBA's Board of Governors, Advisory Finance Committee, and Audit and Compensation Committee.

In addition to his commitments in basketball, Sarver owns a controlling share of RCD Mallorca, a Spanish soccer club.

### THE BUSINESSMAN

Sarver is the Chairman and CEO of Western Alliance Bancorporation (NYSE: WAL), one of the country's top-performing banking companies and ranked No. 4 on the Forbes 2017 "Best Banks in America" list. Alliance Bank of Arizona, a division of Western Alliance Bank, is the largest locally-headquartered bank in Arizona and is ranked No. 4 in deposits in the state. The bank continues to be one of the most active business lenders in Arizona and, in 2017, Sarver was voted Banking CEO of the Year by International Banker magazine, a noted resource for analysis on global banking. Sarver is also the co-founder of Southwest Value Partners, a 26-year-old real estate investment fund.

On January 1, 2017, Sarver began his first one-year term representing the 12th District on the Federal Advisory Council, meeting multiple times a year with the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System in Washington, D.C., to discuss economic and banking matters. Members of the FAC customarily serve three one-year terms.

### THE PHILANTHROPIST

Sarver's philanthropic efforts focus not simply on worthy causes but also giving back to Arizona and its local communities, both through Phoenix Suns Charities and his and his wife's own personal contributions. In 2016, Sarver was presented with the Greater Phoenix Economic Council Distinguished Service Award for his economic and philanthropic leadership and contributions to the Phoenix area.

Under Sarver's leadership, Phoenix Suns Charities has granted more than \$19 million to Arizona non-profits. Phoenix Suns Charities focuses on enhancing the lives of Arizona children and families in need, specifically in the areas of education, healthcare and sports. Most notably, Sarver has spearheaded a successful program called "SunsCentral," through which the team's 'adoption' of a Phoenix high school has dramatically increased the graduation rate of the neighborhood school.

Among his proudest accomplishments, Sarver helped to build the Sarver Heart Center at the University of Arizona in memory of his late father, who was among the first to undergo heart bypass surgery. The center is composed of more than 150 physicians and scientists and aims to prevent and cure cardiovascular

diseases through the three pillars of research, education and patient care. Pioneering doctors at the center have spearheaded the development of the SynCardia temporary Total Artificial Heart, an award-winning project that became the world's first and only total artificial heart to win FDA approval as a bridge to human heart transplant in patients near death from heart failure.

Doctors and researchers at the center also developed a hands-only CPR method called Continuous Chest Compression CPR that more than doubles a person's chance of surviving cardiac arrest. This method was adopted by the American Heart Association and is now internationally recognized. In addition to a focus on resuscitation science, the center focuses on stroke research, heart disease in women, sudden cardiac death, minority-specific cardiovascular problems, and electrophysiology.

The Sarvers were also instrumental in helping to build the Children's Museum of Phoenix, located in downtown Phoenix. A \$1 million donation from the Penny and Robert Sarver Charitable Foundation aided in the completion of the 70,000-square-foot facility.

Sarver is on the board of directors for the Weil Foundation, established by Dr. Andrew Weil, an internationally recognized leader in integrative medicine.

## THE PERSON

Sarver is a 1979 graduate of Sabino High School in Tucson and a 1982 graduate of the University of Arizona. Sarver earned his bachelor's degree in business administration and became a certified public accountant in 1983.

Sarver and wife, Penny, have three sons, Max, Jake and Zach. On their first date, Robert invited Penny to watch the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament at his house. Sarver enjoys watching basketball and soccer at all levels alongside his family.

# JASON ROWLEY

## PRESIDENT



Jason Rowley is in his sixth season as the Suns' President and his 11th season overall with the team. As President, Rowley is responsible for managing all business operations of the Suns and oversees the club's interests in the management of Talking Stick Resort Arena, the WNBA Phoenix Mercury, the NBA G League Northern Arizona Suns,

the Legends Entertainment District, and affiliated entities. Rowley previously served as the team's Chief Operating Officer, as well as its Senior Vice President and General Counsel.

Rowley began his career in 2001 with the law firm of Snell & Wilmer in Phoenix, and while there he represented the Suns' current ownership group in their acquisition of the club in 2004. At Snell, his practice included private and public mergers and acquisitions, complex real estate transactions, securities regulation, entity formation, commercial contracts and general business law.

Rowley earned his bachelor's degree in 1994 from the University of Arizona. After graduation, Rowley joined the United States Navy, an experience he considers one of the proudest and most formative of his life. He worked as an intelligence analyst with the Commander 3rd Fleet Intelligence Division until his honorable discharge in 1998. He then returned to the University of Arizona to pursue his law degree, graduating in 2001.

Rowley is involved in a number of charitable and civic organizations. He serves on Greater Phoenix Leadership, the ASU Walter Cronkite School of Journalism Endowment Board, the Thunderbirds, the Board of Phoenix Suns Charities, and the Board of Downtown Phoenix Inc. He also served as the 2015 American Heart Association Phoenix Heart Walk Chairman, and was named the 2011 Phoenix Father of the Year by the Phoenix Father's Day Council.



# RYAN McDONOUGH

## GENERAL MANAGER



Considered one of the game's brightest minds, Ryan McDonough is in his fifth season as the Phoenix Suns' general manager. Throughout his career, McDonough has combined his tireless work ethic with an expertise in player evaluation that he has honed at several levels of basketball operations with the Suns and Boston Celtics, two of the NBA's most historic franchises.

Under the 36-year-old's direction, the Suns are poised for the future with a collection of talented young players, several experienced veterans and a haul of upcoming draft picks made more valuable with McDonough's successful track record in the NBA Draft.

McDonough has overseen the Suns assemble some of the game's brightest young stars with several first-round picks made in his tenure currently on the roster. Included in this group are Devin Booker, who became just the sixth player to ever score at least 70 points in a game and has totaled the fourth-most points in NBA history before turning 21 years old, Josh Jackson, the fourth overall pick in 2017 named All-NBA Summer League First Team while making his professional debut in Las Vegas this past summer, and T.J. Warren, one of the league's most efficient scoring wings. The team's 2016 draft haul has already shown its promise with the versatile Marquese Chriss earning NBA All-Rookie Second Team honors and floor general Tyler Ulis winning Western Conference Rookie of the Month for April, while Dragan Bender has flashed the all-around skill that made him the fourth overall selection. In upcoming drafts, the Suns own all of their own picks, as well as two first-rounders from Miami in 2018 (top-7 protected) and 2021.

In addition to his success on draft night, McDonough has orchestrated the acquisitions of one of basketball's top point guards in Eric Bledsoe, as well as veteran leaders Tyson Chandler, one of the league's best rebounders, and Jared Dudley, one of the league's most consistent three-point shooters.

Initially named general manager of the Suns on May 7, 2013, a year to that date later, McDonough was named runner-up for NBA Executive of the Year, an award voted on by his peers. Following a series of trades and acquisitions that included the addition of Bledsoe, Phoenix made the NBA's biggest turnaround in 2013-14, improving from 25 wins to 48. In his second and third seasons as general manager, the Suns won 39 and 23 games, respectively, as the team promoted Watson to interim head coach on Jan. 30, 2016, before removing the interim label on April 19 of that year. In McDonough's fourth season, 2016-17, the Suns posted a 24-58 record.

McDonough joined the Suns after serving for three seasons as the assistant general manager of the Boston Celtics, where he assisted Celtics President of Basketball Operations Danny Ainge on all basketball-related matters, while being principally responsible for the draft evaluation of college and international players. He combines the experience of nearly a decade of in-person scouting of prospects across the globe with an understanding of advanced metrics and statistical analysis. During his tenure with the Celtics, Boston made two appearances in the NBA Finals and orchestrated the biggest season-to-season turnaround in NBA history after the acquisitions of future Hall of Famers Ray Allen and Kevin Garnett, improving from 24 wins in 2006-07 to 66 wins and an NBA championship in 2007-08.

McDonough joined the Celtics front office in 2003 as a 23-year-old special assistant to basketball operations, rapidly moving up the team's ranks with increased responsibility at each stop, always with an emphasis in talent evaluation. He spent four seasons as a special assistant, a role that included a great deal of video scouting work (2003-06), one season as director of amateur scouting (2006-07), one season as director of international scouting (2007-08), and two seasons as director of player personnel (2008-10) before his promotion to assistant general manager in Sept. 2010.

McDonough played a prominent role in the front office of a club that kept a veteran-led roster in the playoffs in each of his final six seasons with the Celtics thanks to an infusion of young talent acquired through quality late first-round draft picks and trades. Included in that list are the draft-day acquisition of four-time All-Star Rajon Rondo in 2006, and the 2004 selection of eventual All-NBA center Al Jefferson, who was the centerpiece of the Celtics' 2007 deal to acquire Garnett.

Additionally, McDonough is a member of the Jr. NBA Leadership Council, a group of influencers from across the basketball landscape who help provide direction on the program's development and evolution as part of the league's expanded youth basketball efforts.

A graduate of the University of North Carolina with a degree in Journalism and Mass Communication, McDonough spent one summer while at UNC calling games for the Class-AA Carolina Mudcats. He grew up in Hingham, Mass., the son of the late renowned Boston Globe columnist Will McDonough, and the brother of ABC/ESPN broadcaster and play-by-play voice of "Monday Night Football" Sean, and Arizona Cardinals vice president of player personnel Terry. In the summer of 2015, McDonough and the former Valerie Doseck married in Boston; the couple resides in Phoenix.

# EARL WATSON

**HEAD COACH — 3RD NBA SEASON (33-82, .287), 3RD WITH SUNS (33-82, .287)**



As a freshman at UCLA, Earl Watson began regularly meeting with the most successful coach in college basketball history to discuss basketball, relationships and life. Starting with those inspiring conversations with John Wooden, Watson constantly put himself in a position to be mentored by some of the most illustrious names in basketball

history along a path that saw him play 13 years in the NBA as a player. Following his playing career, Watson became an assistant coach before being named interim head coach on Feb. 1, 2016, then retained as the 17th head coach in Phoenix Suns franchise history on April 19, 2016.

Watson, the second-youngest head coach in the NBA at 38 years old, has compiled a 33-82 record in two seasons as head coach of the Suns, going 24-58 in 2016-17 after posting a 9-24 record over the final 33 games of 2015-16. In his first full season at the helm, the Suns boasted a well-rounded and productive offense, becoming the first team since the 57-win Denver Nuggets of 2012-13 to rank in the NBA's top five in all four miscellaneous scoring categories (points off turnovers, second chance points, fast break points, points in the paint). Prior to joining the Suns' staff as an assistant coach in the summer of 2015, Watson spent one season as an assistant coach for the Austin Spurs of the NBA Development League after his professional playing career came to an end following the 2013-14 season.

At the outset of Watson's career as an 18-year-old at UCLA in 1997, complementing his routine meetings with Wooden, the college freshman would often find himself playing pick-up basketball at Pauley Pavilion with the legendary Magic Johnson who schooled the young point guard in the ability to make his teammates better. A four-year starter for the Bruins, Watson displayed the leadership he would exude throughout his career as he guided the team to three Sweet 16 appearances in the NCAA tournament and remains the prestigious program's all-time leader in steals (235) and minutes played (4,371).

Following his success at UCLA, Watson was selected 40th overall in the 2001 NBA Draft by Seattle as his basketball education extended into his professional career. As a rookie, Hall of Fame point guard Gary Payton mentored Watson with the SuperSonics, before he played the next three seasons

in Memphis. With the Grizzlies Watson played for coaching luminaries Hubie Brown, the NBA Coach of the Year in 2003-04, and Mike Fratello, while the team's general manager who signed and tutored Watson was the iconic Jerry West.

Watson's career continued in Denver under the fifth-winningest coach in NBA history George Karl before he returned to Seattle where he played for Bob Hill, P.J. Carlesimo and Scott Brooks as he moved with the team to Oklahoma City. With the SuperSonics in 2007-08, Watson averaged career-highs of 10.7 points and 6.8 assists, starting in 73 of his 78 appearances. Prior to the 2009-10 season, Watson signed with Indiana where the team's president of basketball operations and basketball legend Larry Bird encouraged his potential in coaching. Watson spent three seasons with Utah from 2010-13, playing for head coach Jerry Sloan in 2010-11 in the final season of the Hall of Famer and third-winningest coach in league history's career.

By the time Watson reached Portland in 2013-14, his career had come full circle: from rookie pupil to bench contributor to regular starter to veteran teacher to mentor. In his final professional season with the Trail Blazers, Watson was a coach in uniform helping the development of rising stars Damian Lillard and C.J. McCollum, playing the role of adviser that some of the most distinguished names and minds in basketball history had played with him. For his career, Watson played in 878 games over 13 seasons, averaging 6.4 points, 4.4 assists and 1.0 steals.

A native of Kansas City, Kansas, and 1997 graduate of Washington High School where he led the Wildcats to their first league title since 1975, the former Kansas City Kansan Player of the Year is still very much revered in and committed to giving back to his hometown. The building that housed the elementary school Watson attended is now a preschool named the Earl Watson Jr. Early Childhood Center.

The first full-time NBA head coach of Mexican descent, in 2017, Watson received the Roberto Clemente Award for Sports Excellence presented by the National Council of La Raza, given to an individual renowned in the world of sports and committed to the advancement of Hispanic Americans. The National Association of Hispanic Real Estate Professionals also honored Watson as their 2017 recipient of the Latino Vanguard Award, recognizing artists, authors and public figures who have transcended barriers in their lives and careers and whose contributions have elevated the image and quality of life for Latinos in America.

# ASSISTANT COACHES

## JAY TRIANO – ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH



Jay Triano is in his second season as associate head coach with the Suns, coming to Phoenix after four seasons as an assistant coach with the Portland Trail Blazers, including in Suns Head Coach Earl Watson's final season as a player in 2013-14. Formerly the head coach of the Toronto Raptors from 2008-11 (87-142, .380), Triano was the first Canadian-born head coach in NBA history. He also served as vice president of pro scouting with the Raptors after his tenure as head coach, and as an assistant coach with the team for six seasons from 2002-08.

In addition to his NBA coaching experience, Triano is head coach of the men's national team for Canada Basketball, named to the position in 2012 by Canadian National Team General Manager Steve Nash. For Triano, who led Canada to a silver medal finish at the 2015 Pan American Games, this is his second time as the head coach of the Canadian men's national team after also holding the position from 1999-2004. In 1999, Triano led Canada to silver at the Tournament of the Americas to qualify for the 2000 Sydney Olympics where the nation placed seventh.

Between his tenures with Canada Basketball, Triano worked with USA Basketball as an assistant coach on the 2010 USA National Team that won gold in the FIBA World Championship over host country Turkey. Triano also served as an assistant coach for USA Select teams that trained against the national teams in 2007 and 2008, and as head coach of the Select Team in 2012. Triano has also worked as a coach with Basketball Without Borders in Istanbul (2008), Senegal (2010), Slovenia (2011) and Australia (2011).

Triano, who played collegiately at Simon Fraser University where he was later head coach, played for the Canadian national team for 11 years from 1978-88 and was team captain from 1981-88. Additionally, in 2016, he was awarded an Honorary Doctorate of Laws Degree from the University of Calgary. A native of Niagara Falls, Ontario, he represented Canada as a player in two Olympic Games (1984 and 1988), serving as captain in each. Following his playing career at Simon Fraser, Triano was selected in the eighth round of the 1981 NBA Draft by the Los Angeles Lakers and the sixth round of the 1981 CFL Draft by the Calgary Stampeders.

## TYRONE CORBIN – ASSISTANT COACH



Tyrone Corbin returns to Phoenix in his second season as an assistant coach where he played in 107 games and averaged 8.1 points over two seasons with the Suns as a player from 1987-89. Combining nearly 30 years of experience as an NBA player and coach, Corbin spent parts of five seasons as a head coach with the Utah Jazz and Sacramento Kings (119-167, .416). Most recently prior to joining the Suns, he served as an assistant coach with the Kings before being promoted to interim head coach for 28 games in the 2014-15 season.

Prior to his time as a coach in Sacramento, Corbin spent four seasons as head coach of the Jazz, finishing with a winning record in two of his three full seasons at the helm. He led the Jazz to the playoffs in 2011-12 and just missed the postseason in 2012-13 despite posting a 43-39 record. Joining Utah's coaching staff in 2004, he spent seven seasons as an assistant before succeeding Jerry Sloan as the team's head coach in the 2010-11 season. Corbin served as either an assistant or head coach for all of Suns Head Coach Earl Watson's three seasons as a player with the Jazz from 2010-13.

A 16-season NBA veteran as a player, Corbin averaged 9.2 points and 4.7 rebounds over 1,065 career games with nine teams. His best statistical season came in 1990-91 when he averaged a career-high 18.0 points as well as 7.2 rebounds in 82 games with the Minnesota Timberwolves. Corbin originally joined the Suns along with Kevin Johnson, Mark West and the draft pick that would become Dan Majerle as part of trade with the Cleveland Cavaliers at the trade deadline in 1988. After playing parts of two seasons with Phoenix, he was selected by the Timberwolves in the NBA expansion draft.

A DePaul University graduate and Columbia, S.C., native, Corbin was initially selected with the 35th overall pick in the 1985 NBA Draft by the San Antonio Spurs.

Corbin and his wife, Dante, have two children, TyJha and Tyrell.

# ASSISTANT COACHES

## NATE BJORKGREN – ASSISTANT COACH



In his third season as an assistant coach with the Phoenix Suns, Nate Bjorkgren (pronounced BEE-ork-Gren) remains on the front of the bench after being promoted to the position midway through the 2015-16 season. Bjorkgren joined the Suns after one season as head coach with the team's NBA Development

League affiliate, leading the Bakersfield Jam to a 34-16 record and Western Conference Semifinals appearance in 2014-15, also winning the inaugural Showcase Cup Championship.

Bjorkgren served as head coach for the Suns' entry at NBA Summer League in Las Vegas in 2015 and 2016, directing the team to a 5-2 record and runner-up finish in 2015 and a 4-2 record and semifinals finish in 2016. During his time in Bakersfield he coached several Suns players, in addition to serving as a member of the Suns' coaching staff at NBA Summer League 2014 in Las Vegas and training camp prior to the start of the 2014-15 season.

An experienced head coach in the D-League, Bjorkgren amassed a 92-58 record at the helm of the Dakota Wizards, Santa Cruz Warriors and Iowa Energy prior to joining the Jam.

Totaling a 126-74 (.630) record overall as a D-League head coach, he led the Energy to the Central Division title in 2013-14 and the Warriors to the 2012-13 NBA D-League Finals. Before becoming the head coach of the Wizards in 2011-12, Bjorkgren spent four seasons as an assistant coach with the Energy from 2007-11.

Bjorkgren returns to Arizona where early in his coaching career he served as the head coach of Cactus Shadows High School in Cave Creek for three seasons from 2004-07. The recipient of Arizona state high school coach of the year honors in 2005-06 and regional coach of the year honors in 2004-05 and 2005-06, Bjorkgren led the Falcons to the Class 4A state tournament in each of his three seasons with the school.

A native of Storm Lake, Iowa, Bjorkgren played collegiately at Buena Vista University and the University of South Dakota. As a point guard at Buena Vista, he led the Beavers to their first conference title in 21 years in 1997.

Bjorkgren and his wife Heidi have two children, Kaylee and Jarrett.

## MARLON GARNETT – ASSISTANT COACH/PLAYER DEVELOPMENT COORDINATOR



In his second season with the Phoenix Suns as assistant coach/player development coordinator, Marlon Garnett joined the Suns after previously working as a player development and quality assurance assistant with the San Antonio Spurs. Garnett entered the coaching ranks following a long professional

career as a player, internationally and in the NBA. At NBA Summer League 2017 in Las Vegas, Garnett served as head coach of the "Summer Suns," directing the team to a 2-4 record.

A former NBA player who appeared in 24 games with the Boston Celtics during the 1998-99 season, Garnett continued his professional career with clubs in Turkey, Spain, Italy, Croatia, Iran, Puerto Rico, Slovakia and played as a member of the Belizean National Team before his playing career came to an end in 2013. Following his playing days, Garnett spent the 2014-15 season as head coach at Union Academy in Monroe, N.C. Garnett is also a certified personal trainer and operated his own basketball skills academy, Team Garnett Basketball Academy.

Originally from Los Angeles, Garnett had a standout college career at Santa Clara University where he spent three seasons as a teammate of two-time NBA MVP and Suns Ring of Honor member Steve Nash. Garnett and Nash teamed to help the Broncos reach back-to-back NCAA tournament appearances in 1995 and 1996. Following Nash's departure, Garnett averaged 17.4 points as a senior in 1996-97 to earn West Coast Conference Player of the Year honors and give a Santa Clara player the award for the third straight year after Nash had won it the previous two seasons.

Garnett and his wife, Anais, have two daughters, Amaia and Sarai.



# PLAYER DEVELOPMENT COACHES

## SCOTT DUNCAN



Scott Duncan is in his second season as a player development coach with the Suns, joining the team following five seasons as associate head coach at the University of Wyoming. Duncan moves to the NBA after over 35 years of experience as an assistant coach at the collegiate level, including Division I programs that advanced to the postseason in 22 of his final 29 seasons in college basketball.

Prior to his time at Wyoming, where he helped the Cowboys to a Mountain West tournament title and NCAA tournament berth in 2014-15, Duncan spent four seasons as an assistant coach at UCLA, including for the Bruins' Final Four run in 2008. With a reputation as one of the country's best recruiters on the

college level, Duncan also had stops as an assistant coach at Oregon (2000-07), Clemson (1998-2000), a first tenure at Wyoming (1997-98), Washington State (1995-97), Northern Illinois (1991-95), Fresno State (1991), New Mexico (1980-90) and Cleveland State (1978-80).

A native of Cleveland, Ohio, Duncan graduated from the College of Wooster in Wooster, Ohio, in 1978 with a degree in physical education and economics. He was a two-year letterman in basketball for the Fighting Scots.

## JASON FRASER



Jason Fraser is in his third season as a player development coach with the Phoenix Suns, originally joining the club after one season as an assistant coach for the Austin Spurs of the NBA Development League. While helping Austin to a Southwest Division title in his one season with the club in 2014-15, Fraser worked alongside fellow Spurs assistant and now Suns Head Coach

Earl Watson.

Prior to joining Austin's staff, Fraser spent the 2013-14 season as director of student-athlete development at his alma mater, Villanova University. Coming to Villanova after being

named a 2002 McDonald's All-American, Fraser was a standout center for four seasons from 2002-06. Despite enduring seven different surgical procedures during his collegiate career, Fraser left Villanova ranked fifth on the school's all-time blocked shots list (172) and 22nd on the all-time rebounding list (637). As a junior in 2004-05, Fraser helped the Wildcats to their first Sweet 16 appearance since 1988, then as a senior in 2005-06 contributed to Villanova's Big East regular season championship and Elite Eight run in the NCAA tournament. After his collegiate career, Fraser played professionally overseas and for the Harlem Globetrotters before returning to Villanova.

A native of Amityville, New York, Fraser and his wife Tashay have two children, Blessing and Elery Jason Fraser II.

## MEHMET OKUR



A former NBA All-Star who played 10 years in the league, Mehmet Okur (pronounced MEM-it O-cur) is in his second season as a player development coach with the Phoenix Suns, specializing in the skills development of the Suns' post players. After his playing career came to an end in 2012, Okur spent time as a team ambassador for the Utah Jazz where he was a fan favorite nicknamed "The Money Man" for his clutch shooting.

Okur averaged 13.5 points and 7.0 rebounds while shooting 37.5 percent from three-point territory over 634 games as a 6-11 forward/center with the Detroit Pistons, Jazz and New Jersey Nets. He played most his career with Utah, averaging 15.3 points

and 7.6 rebounds over seven seasons with the team (2004-11), earning an All-Star nod in 2007 to become the first native of Turkey to be named an NBA All-Star. In Okur's final season with the Jazz in 2010-11, he was a teammate of Suns Head Coach Earl Watson and they played for current Suns assistant coach Tyrone Corbin.

Originally the 38th overall pick of the 2001 NBA Draft by Detroit, Okur played his first two seasons with the Pistons (2002-04) and was a member of their 2004 NBA Championship team. His final NBA season was his only one with the Nets, playing in 17 games with the team in 2011-12.

A native of Yalova, Turkey, Okur carried the Olympic flame during the Olympic Torch relay in Istanbul prior to the 2004 Athens Olympics. He and his wife, Yeliz Caliskan, a former Miss Turkey finalist, have three children, Melisa, Yigit and Mert.
